SLIP STITCH TEXTURED SCARF
BY BEATA JEZEK



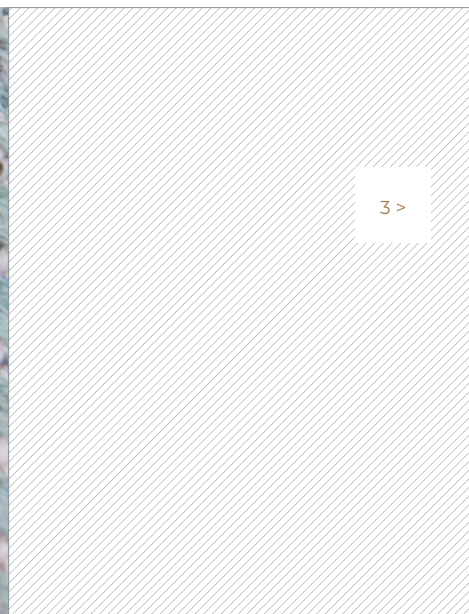
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BEGINNER FRIENDLY SLIP STITCH SCARF THAT LETS YOUR YARN SHINE. COMBINE A SKEIN OF TWEEDY WITH A VARIEGATED OR SPECKLED COLOURWAY OF YOUR CHOICE AND WATCH THE MULTI-COLOURED BLIPS EMERGE.



ABBREVIATIONS

RS - right side
WS - wrong side

k - knit
p - purl

kfb - knit into the front and then the back of the same stitch
k2tog - knit two stitches together

sl1wyif - slip one with yarn in front
sl1wyib - slip one with yarn in back

OVERVIEW

YARN	Colour A: 2 skeins of Hedgehog Fibres Tweedy (230m/100g). Colourway pictured: Connemara Colour B: 1 skein of Hedgehog Fibres Merino DK (200m/100g). Colourway pictured: Oyster
NEEDLE	4.5 mm/ US 7 or to obtain gauge, the scarf is worked flat.
GAUGE	20 stitches and 32 rows = 4"/10cm in slip stitch pattern, after light blocking
SIZE	190cm x 37cm (75 inches x 15 inches)
TOOLS	Stitch markers if desired
SKILLS REQUIRED	Casting on, casting off, increases, decreases

INSTRUCTIONS

A or B before row instruction indicates working yarn for that row.

Setup:

With A, Cast on 3

A: Row 1 (WS): k

A: Row 2 (RS): k1, kfb, k1

A: Row 3 (WS): k

B: Row 4 (RS) and 5 (WS): k

A: Row 6 (RS): k2, kfb, k1

A: Row 7 (WS): k

B: Row 8 (RS) and 9 (WS): k

A: Row 10 (RS): k to last 2, kfb, k1

A: Row 11 (WS): k

B: Row 12 (RS) and 13 (WS): k (6 stitches)

A: Row 14 (RS): k to last 4, kfb, k3

A: Row 15 (WS): k3, p to last 3, k3

B: Row 16 (RS): k3, sl1wyib, k3

B: Row 17 (WS): k3, sl1wyif, k3

A: Row 18 (RS): k to last 4, kfb, k3

A: Row 19 (WS): k3, p to last 3, k3

B: Row 20 (RS): k3, k1, sl1wyib, k3

B: Row 21 (WS): k3, sl1wyif, k1, k3

A: Row 22 (RS): k to last 4, kfb, k3

A: Row 23 (WS): k3, purl to last 3, k3

B: Row 24 (RS): k3, sl1wyib, k1, sl1wyib, k3

B: Row 25 (WS): k3, sl1wyif, k1, sl1wyif, k3 (9 stitches)

Increase section:

A: Row 1 (RS): k to last 4, kfb, k3

A: Row 2 (WS): k3, purl to last 3, k3

B: Row 3 (RS): k3, *k1, sl1wyib, rep from * to last 3 st, k3

B: Row 4 (WS): k3, *sl1wyif, k1, rep from * to last 3 st, k3

A: Row 5 (RS): k to last 4, kfb, k3

A: Row 6 (WS): k3, purl to last 3, k3

B: Row 7 (RS): k3, *sl1wyib, k1, rep from *, to last 4 st, sl1wyib, k3

B: Row 8 (WS): k3, *sl1wyif, k1, rep from *, to last 4 st, sl1wyif, k3

Repeat rows 1-8 until you have 79 stitches

Decrease section:

A: Row 1 (RS): k to last 5, k2tog, k3

A: Row 2 (WS): k3, purl to last 3, k3

B: Row 3 (RS): k3, *k1, sl1wyib, rep from * to last 3 st, k3

B: Row 4 (WS): k3, *sl1wyif, k1, rep from * to last 3 st, k3

A: Row 5 (RS): k to last 5, k2tog, k3

A: Row 6 (WS): k3, purl to last 3, k3

B: Row 7 (RS): k3, *sl1wyib, k1, rep from *, to last 4 st, sl1wyib, k3

B: Row 8 (WS): k3, *sl1wyif, k1, rep from *, to last 4 st, sl1wyif, k3

Repeat rows 1-8 until 9 stitches left.

Continue decreasing the remaining stitches as follows:

A: Row 1 (RS): k4, k2tog, k3 (8 stitches)

A: Row 2 (WS): k3, p2, k3

B: Row 3 (RS): k3, k1, sl1wyib, k3

B: Row 4 (WS): k3, sl1wyif, k1, k3

A: Row 5 (RS): k3, k2tog, k3 (7 stitches)

A: Row 6 (WS): k3, p1, k3

B: Row 7 (RS): k

B: Row 8 (WS): k

A: Row 9 (RS): k3, k2tog, k2 (6 stitches)

A: Row 10 (WS): k

B: Row 11 (RS): k

B: Row 12 (WS): k

A: Row 13 (RS): k2, k2tog, k2 (5 stitches)

A: Row 14 (WS): k

B: Row 15 (RS): k

B: Row 16 (WS): k

A: Row 17 (RS): k2, k2tog, k1 (4 stitches)

A: Row 18 (WS): k

B: Row 19 (RS): k

B: Row 20 (WS): k

A: Row 21 (RS): k2, k2tog (3 stitches)

A: Row 22 (WS): k

Break yarns and tie off final stitch with yarn A.

Finishing:

Weave in your ends, block lightly.

CARE NOTES

Whether you are using commercially dyed yarn or lovely hand-dyed skeins, please keep in mind that colours might bleed. None of the examples shown bled, but I always knit up a sample and wash it as you would your finished item to be sure. Please use common sense - reds and crazy pinks tend to bleed the most, any red/white combo is probably not a good idea (we separate laundry, right?). To minimise bleeding, gently soak the swatch/finished item in cold water with a mild detergent or wool wash. The gentler you wash your project the better it will look over time.

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
