## ABBREVIATIONS

k - knit
p-purl
ssk - slip 1 st, slip the next, then put left needle back into the slipped sts and knit them together.

# OVERVIEW 

$\begin{array}{ll}\text { YARN } & \begin{array}{l}1 \text { skein of Hedgehog Fibres Super Bulky }(82 \mathrm{~m} / 150 \mathrm{~g}) \\ \text { Colourway pictured: Fool's Gold }\end{array}\end{array}$

NEEDLE
10 mm / US 15 circular or double pointed needles, the hat is worked in the round. Adjust needle size to obtain correct gauge.

GAUGE
13 stitches and 13 rows $=4 " / 10 \mathrm{~cm}$ in $1 \times 1$ rib pattern, unstretched.

SIZE
34 cm (13.5 inches) circumference unstretched and 17cm (6.5 inches) tall. The knot is approx. 9 cm ( 3.5 inches) long.

TOOLS
Stitch markers if desired

SKILLS REQUIRED Casting on, working in the round, decreases

## INSTRUCTIONS

Cast on 40 stitches using German Twisted cast on (link with instructions here).
Join in the round. Work $1 \times 1$ rib as follows:
Round 1: *k1, p1, repeat from * to end.
Repeat Round 1 approx. 16 more rounds or as desired.
Work crown decreases as follows:
Decrease Round 1: *ssk, (k1,p1)* 10 times, 30 stitches remain.
Round 2: *(k2, p1)* 10 times.
Round 3: *(k1, ssk)* 10 times, 20 stitches remain.
Round 4: knit
Round 5: ssk 10 times, 10 stitches remain
Round 6-31: k
Round 32: ssk 5 times, 5 stitches remain.

Break yarn.
Thread a tapestry needle and pull the tail through the remaining stitches to close.
Weave in ends and tie a knot.

## CARE NOTES

Whether you are using commercially dyed yarn or lovely hand-dyed skeins, please keep in mind that colours might bleed. None of the examples shown bled, but I always knit up a sample and wash it as you would your finished item to be sure. Please use common sense - reds and crazy pinks tend to bleed the most, any red/white combo is probably not a good idea (we separate laundry, right?). To minimise bleeding, gently soak the swatch/finished item in cold water with a mild detergent or wool wash. The gentler you wash your project the better it will look over time.

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
