Cast on and Direction of knitting






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STRIPED MODULAR SCARF THAT USES UP 3 SINGLE SKEINS FROM YOUR STASH. I KNITTED THE SAMPLE WITH ALPACA BOUCLE AND MERINO DK, BUT TWEEDY, SOCK YARN OR EVEN SKINNY SINGLES WOULD BE A GREAT CHOICE. HAVE FUN WITH COLOURS! THE FUZZY TEXTURE ADDS A LOVELY ELEMENT TO THE SIMPLICITY OF THIS DESIGN.



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ABBREVIATIONS

RS - right side WS - wrong side

k - knit p - purl

st(s) - stitch(es)

kfb - knit into the front and then the back of the same stitch **k2tog** - knit 2 stitches together



OVERVIEW

YARN 2 skeins of Hedgehog Fibres Merino DK (100% Merino wool,

100g/200m) in two different colourways.

1 skein of Hedgehog Fibres Alpaca Boucle (66% Alpaca/34%

Silk, 100g/620m).

The colours pictured are A: 'Sugar' and C:'Labyrinth' for the

Merino DK and Alpaca Boucle in B: 'Moon Stone'.

NEEDLE US6 / 3.75 mm needles, circular or straight. The scarf is knit-

ted flat. The gauge is not hugely important for this garment.

GAUGE 18 sts and 36 rows = 4" / 10 cm in garter stitch, blocked lightly

by washing and laying flat to dry

SIZE 195 x 29cm / 77 x 11 inches for for the knitted sample pictured

using yarn, gauge and needles specified.

TOOLS Stitch marker if desired to mark RS from WS

SKILLS REQUIRED Casting on, casting off, increasing, decreasing

INSTRUCTIONS

The scarf is worked in 2-row stripes, alternating Merino DK and Alpaca Boucle throughout. Colours as indicated are:

A: Merino DK - Sugar

B: Alpaca Boucle - Moonstone

C: Merino DK - Labyrinth

With A cast on 2 stitches, work in 2 row stripes alternating colours A and B as follows:

Section 1:

A: Row 1 (RS): kfb, k to end

A: Row 2 (WS): kfb, k to end

B: Row 3 (RS): kfb, k to end

B: Row 4 (WS): kfb, k to end

Repeat Rows 1-4 20 more times, 86 stitches

Section 2:

A: Row 1 (RS): k2tog, k to end

A: Row 2 (WS): kfb, k to end

B: Row 3 (RS): k2tog, k to end

B: Row 4 (WS): kfb, k to end

Repeat Rows 1-4, 40 more times.

Cut Colour A, join in colour C.

Section 3:

Work in short rows, adding one stitch from section 2 every RS row. Start Row 1 using colour C as follows:

C: Row 1 (RS): k2, turn

C: Row 2 (WS): k2, turn

B: Row 3 (RS): k3, turn

B: Row 4 (WS): k1, k2tog, turn

C: Row 5 (RS): k3, turn

C: Row 6 (WS): k3, turn

B: Row 7 (RS): k4, turn

B: Row 8 (WS): k4, turn

C: Row 9 (RS): k5, turn

C: Row 10 (WS): k5, turn

B: Row 11 (RS): k6, turn

B: Row 12 (WS): k4, k2tog, turn

Repeat Rows 5-12, in the established stripe pattern, until all stitches from the 'straight section' have been worked. Subsequent rows, after working the final 'straight section' stitch, are worked even.

Section 4:

Work even, alternating colours C and B in the stripe pattern until the scarf is a desired length.

Cast off and weave in ends. Block lightly by washing and laying flat.

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Care Notes

Whether you are using commercially dyed yarn or lovely hand-dyed skeins, please keep in mind that colours might bleed. None of the examples shown bled, but I always knit up a sample and wash it as you would your finished item to be sure. Please use common sense - reds and crazy pinks tend to bleed the most, any red/white combo is probably not a good idea (we separate laundry, right?). To minimise bleeding, gently soak the swatch/finished item in cold water with a mild detergent or wool wash. The gentler you wash your project the better it will look over time.

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
