

Drapery Swags I

These swags are usually placed in front of a drapery and attached to the same rod. Swag A, width will adapt 14" to 26" and hangs 22" deep. This is an Empire style and very easy to make. Swag B, width will adapt 16" to 24" with the depth varying from 25" to 24". This swag has 4 folds and a pointed bottom. The side horns are cut separately and sewn to the swag to become a part of it. Swag C, width will adapt 12" to 16" with the depth of 20". The 39" deep spiral tail shown with Swag A and C is separate and does not offer a return. It cannot be altered.

Drapery swags are more effective with a heavy trim. Measurements above do not include trim.

Fabric Suggestions: The spiral tail and Swag A will have no bulk problems. The fabric can be as thick as you like as long as it is soft. Lightweight fabrics can also be used with a heavy trim. Swag B andC can create bulk problems in the pleat stack up. It is best to use fabrics no thicker then a soft damask. The spiral tail, Swag A, and the horns on Swag B should be self or contrast lined. If no trim is being used, the lining may show around the edge on all swags.

YARDAGE

With so many different fabric widths and repeats available today, we find it works best if we give you the actual pattern sizes so you can determine how they will fit on your fabric.

Swag A (upright cut).	the pattern is	48" wide x 27" deep
Swag B (bias cut)	the pattern is	38" wide x 38" deep
Swag C (bias cut)	the pattern is	30" wide x 30" deep
Swag B horn (two are	needed) the pattern is	15" wide x 27" deep
Spiral tail	the pattern is	20" wide x 43" deep

Same amount of lining will be needed.

Yardage for Trims

Trims must be able to curve.
