

- 5. What does it mean to say that Jodo Shinshu is a religion of fearlessness? Have you encountered the use of fear in religion?

- 1. How does Dr. Wilson use the term "queer" in this chapter?
- 2. How is the history of Buddhism and LGBTQ+ issues similar to or different from other religions?
- 3. Who was Prince Shotoku? How does he function as a queer figure in Buddhist history?
- 4. How does Dr. Wilson explain the meaning of Amida Buddha's 35th Vow? Have you encountered discrimination in Buddhism? How can we work to reduce it?
- 5. What are the factors that made Jodo Shinshu so accepting of same-sex marriage long before it was legalized? How do those factors play into treatment of other groups facing discrimination or hardships?
- 6. Why does Dr. Wilson say that LGBTQ+ and other marginalized people are at the heart of Amida Buddha's mission? What would it look like if we practiced Buddhism with such an attitude?

# Chapter 3 Refugee Shinran

- 1. What hardships did Shinran Shonin face? How did they affect his teaching of Buddhism?
- 2. What hardships did Rennyo Shonin face? How did they affect his teaching of Buddhism?
- 3. How did the World War II incarceration affect Buddhists? What lessons can be taken from that experience?

# Chapter 4 Buddhism in the Age of the Refugee

- 1. What are some of the challenges we face in the 21st Century? How have Buddhists been victims and perpetrators of these crises?
- 2. How do the sangha and the Pure Land serve as models for a more functional and compassionate society?
- 3. How does the Buddhist vision of interconnection and concern for others inform the examples of social action by Jodo Shinshu Buddhists, such as support for refugees, solidarity with the Muslim community, and care for those experiencing homelessness?

### Chapter 5 Principles for Engaged Shin Buddhism

- 1. What does the first principle, "Amida Embraces All Beings Unconditionally" mean? What are the implications for how should conduct our lives and act toward others?

- 4. What does the fourth principle, "The Indebtedness of Interconnection" mean? How aware are you of the myriad factors that support your life and Buddhist practice?
- 5. What does the fifth principle, "Action Expresses Gratitude" mean? How do you try to express your gratitude?
- 6. What does the sixth principle, "Circulation of Compassion" mean? How does it relate to the bodhisattvas of the Pure Land? How can we take it as a model for our own action to help the world?
