

## INSTRUCTIONS:

**Prep:** You'll need approximately half a metre of fabric, scissors, pins, a sewing machine, thread & a pencil to mark the fabric. An iron is handy but not essential.

**STEP 1:** Cut out the pattern pieces on the fold. (A seam allowance of 1cm is already included in the pattern).

**STEP 2:** Now place the two side panels printed sides together, then pin and sew up the sides of the panels. You can press open the seams with the iron after doing this.

**STEP 3:** Turn the side panels the right way out and place them on the top of the hat, pinning the top of the sides around the circumference of the top. The printed sides of the fabric should be together.

**STEP 4:** Stitch all around the top once it's all pinned. If there's too much fabric from the sides of the hat, you can rectify this by going back and taking in the side seams slightly. Excess fabric from the top of the hat? Then pin the sides in further towards the centre of the circle.

**STEP 5:** Grab the four brim panels you've cut out and place them printed sides together, then pin and stitch along the long, curved bottom edges.

**STEP 6:** Once that's done, place the stitched brims on top of each other (with the raw seams facing outwards) and pin and stitch the sides together.

**STEP 7:** Now you can turn the brim the right way out, pressing down the seams. Then topstitch all around the edge once or twice to give it some structure.

**STEP 8:** Finally, take the cap and place it inside the brim, with the printed side facing the outside of the brim. Match up the side seams of the brim and the hat and pin, then stitch all the way around. And you're done! Happy wearing.

## SIZING (requires a measuring tape)

Wanna double-check your measurements?

To get your size, place the measuring tape around your head about 1/8" above your ear, across the mid-forehead, completely circling your head.

Small: 54.5cm (21.5")

Medium: 57cm (22.5")

Large: 59.5cm (23.5")



**Please make sure to print the pattern out at a scale of 100% to maintain proportions.**
