

Robert and Terreca Endresen They have a 27' Regency Pontoon boat out of the area. Robert is Retired Army and Retired from DHS.


As you can see on the club calendar we are again having our monthly new members Friday Pot Luck. Be sure to meet and great our new members to make them feel part of our NYC family!







## ARMED FORCES DAY RACE, MAY 22, 2021 Notice of Race

- 1. Rules: This event is governed by the rules defined in the current edition of the Racing Rules of Sailing.
- Sailing Instructions & Course: NYCLB Course Chart OF 2021 and associated Sailing Instructions will be used. These are
  available on the NYCLB website (nyclb.org). Amendments will be posted to the Official Notice Board and NYCLB website not later
  than 1800 of the day before the race.
- 3. Eligibility and Entry:
  - 3.1. This event is open to members of all SCYA Yacht Clubs with a valid PHRF certificate. The following classes are invited to participate: Spinnaker, Non-Spinnaker and any One-Design Class of 3 or more boats. All boats shall use their Area C RLC handicaps. A boat wishing to race Non-Spinnaker shall use the non-spinnaker offset rating printed on her PHRF certificate.
  - 3.2. Eligible boats may enter by completing the entry form or entering online on the NYCLB website and submitting the required fee of \$15 to one of the addresses below not later than May 20, 2021.
  - 3.3. This event is part of the Long Beach Harbor High Point Series.
- 4. Schedule: One race will be sailed on May 22, 2021. The scheduled time of the warning signal for the first class is 1155.
- 5. Penalty System:
  - 5.1. RRS 44.1 is changed so that the Two-Turns Penalty is replaced by the One-Turn Penalty
  - 5.2. A boat may take a post-race penalty as described in U.S. Sailing Prescription Appendix V2
- 6. Risk Statement & Waiver of Liability:
  - 6.1. RRS 3 states: 'The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue to race is hers alone.' By participating in this event each competitor agrees and acknowledges that sailing is a potentially dangerous activity with inherent risks. These risks include strong winds and rough seas, sudden changes in weather, failure of equipment, boat handling errors, poor seamanship by other boats, loss of balance on an unstable platform and fatigue resulting in increased risk of injury. Inherent in the sport of sailing is the risk of permanent, catastrophic injury or death by drowning, trauma, hypothermia or other causes.
  - 6.2. The race organizers (organizing authority, race committee, protest committee, host club, sponsors, or any other organization or official) will not be responsible for damage to any boat or other property or the injury to any competitor, including death, sustained as a result of participation in this event. By participating in this event, each competitor agrees to release the race organizers from any and all liability associated with such competitor's participation in this event to the fullest extent permitted by law.
- 7. Prizes & Social: Trophies will be presented at NYCLB following the race. There will be a no-host bar and refreshments.



#### Frank and Lara in Antarctica...Part 1...Argentina

OK, it all started with my recently retired sister-in-law Pat telling my wife Lara that Antarctica was on her bucket list of places to visit...mainly to see some penguins. While Antarctica may be of interest to some folks as a place to visit, in my mind it would be near the bottom of a list of desirable world destinations...most likely after places more closely associated with warmth at that. So Lara and Pat scoured the travel sites and booked a trip, including myself and Pat's partner, Bev.

The configuration of this 3 week adventure was in 2 parts: Buenos Aires, Argentina/Patagonia and then the Antarctica Peninsula. After receiving final confirmation of the details by the trip provider (Overseas Adventure Travel...OAT), we faced the first problem....packing! The Argentine airlines set a limit of 50 lbs for the checked bag and 17 lbs for a 21 inch high carry on bag. A personal item was allowed though. This limit was further aggravated by the fact that we would be in 2 different temperature zones! Warm in Argentina and near freezing in Antarctica. OAT, in preparation for the cold condition, had sent each of us a bulky red parka emblazed with the appropriate OAT patch proudly declaring our participation in the adventure. This bulky 2 lb parka had to be included in the items packed into the luggage. A vacuum bag reduced this down to the size of a pizza!

In our vast and varied inventory of suitcases at home, we had multiple carry on bags..all were 23 inches which are acceptable to US airlines. However, the Argentine carrier wanted 21 inch...we did find one, but not two. So I hunted hi and low shopping for another 21 inch bag...no dice. I finally decided to take a chance and go with one of our 23 inchers.

Now, what to pack to stay within the weight limits and the different temperatures zones? We anticipated existing in near freezing Antarctic temperatures. The recommended strategy for Antarctica was to layer up with thermal garments and then an outer covering of waterproof pants. The supplied parka would take care of the upper body thermal protection. Multiple phone calls and texts between Lara and Pat were generated: "What are you packing?...! don't know, what are you packing?". In addition to the arctic garments, of course there had to be the inclusion of the fashionable garments and accessories for the Buenos Aires trip as well as for the social life aboard the ship. This was a dilemma for Lara as she, if possible, would prefer to take a steamer trunk...the kind with multiple drawers. Eventually, we managed to jam everything into the carefully weighted containers and with passports and boarding passes in hand were ready to go on Feb 10, 2020.

After a pickup call to an Uber guy (who, like a radio, would not stop talking), we headed to LAX to meet Pat (coming in from SFO). Looking like the homeless, wearing coats, boots and the extra clothing we couldn't fit into the bags, we then all boarded the flight to Buenos Aires. Even though we were seated in Premium Economy to ensure a comfortable flight for 10 hours, we were still leery of the 2 dreaded nightmare scenarios of long haul flights: sick sneezing people with hacking coughs and/or screaming babies. To prepare for the first case we had sterilizer wipes and multiple hand sanitizer containers. Like we were preparing for surgery, we wiped down the seats, armrests, tray table and were considering to do the same to those passengers around us...even though they didn't appear to need it....but we thought that it wouldn't hurt. We also slathered our hands with the hand sanitizer stuff for extra protection. If I didn't have so much extra clothing on, I would have put it on my face and arms. Although we did not wear masks we felt adequately protected as if a witch doctor had cast a spell over us protecting us from all disease and flesh eating zombies.

Ten hours later, we landed in **Buenos Aires**, Argentina...of course, it was warm there. We met up with the OAT guide and some fellow travelers, grabbed the bags, went through customs and were loaded into the small bus to take us to the hotel appropriately named the *Panamericano*. Now this was first time to South America for me and did not really know what to (con't on next page)

expect. My only comparison to a southern Latin American country was Mexico. As we headed to the hotel on the bus, we noticed the size of Buenos Aires...it is a big city. The skyline is an forest of high rise buildings rising out of the landscape...mostly apartment structures as most of the folks live and work in the city. The architecture is of European influence as well as the culture. The Spanish spoken is castellan as in Spain, not the colloquial spanish of Mexico. The city is bustling and vibrant, everybody is on the move...mostly young people. There is much more to say about the city, but at another time and place. But Buenos Aires is primarily known for 3 things: meat, the tango and Eva (Evita 'Don't cry for me Argentina') Peron...and did I say meat.

We arrived at the large and excellent hotel, checked into our assigned rooms, and after a restup met up with our assigned team leader and the balance of the "team" to discuss what the plan was to be. OAT caters strictly to Americans, so the team was comprised of folks from all over the country. All were physically fit and seasoned travelers (age range from 66-75) with multiple OAT trips under their collective belts. Later we were to learn there was a 90 year old lady on the trip!

The core trip was to Antarctica with an optional 5 day pre-trip to Patagonia and optional 4 day post-trip to Brazil. Since we had purchased the additional pre-trip, we got there 5 days earlier than some of the other travelers. There were 11 other travelers in our particular pre-trip team. (Note: the total trip was comprised of 80 travelers, broken down into 4 groups of 20, each team had a separate team leader...all from Argentina. Each team leader had control of their respective teams and were kept separate from the other teams. Ultimately, we would all meet together on the ship). The meeting discussion was focused on the Patagonia trip to the town of Bariloche the next day. After the discussion, we were told of a dinner for us later in the afternoon...and don't be late. After some brief sight seeing around the hotel and changing of some money (1\$=60 Argpesos, although Argentine merchants took dollars as well) we met up at the bus for ride to dinner.

The dinner was at large restaurant whose specialty was, you guessed it...meat...and lots of it. There were some of the other team's pre-trip members there as well...about 30 folks total. The menu was salad, drinks, dessert and beef (or chicken). The cut was sirloin, excellent...cooked just right. However, seeing and smelling the huge and plentiful platters of beef being paraded out of the kitchen and onto the tables I was certain I could feel my arteries began to harden.

The 3 hour flight to **Bariloche** required a 4 am wakeup and once again required taking the 50lb and 17 lb bags and gear with us as before. The flight was with a local airline with smaller aircraft that we anticipated to be a flying petrie dish of loose and undulating bacteria looking to latch onto to the nearest unsuspecting host. So we took the same precautions as before, wipes and hand sanitizer, however, there was one person who coughed most of the trip. I just wanted to reach out and pull out the oxygen mask from the overhead and seal it to her face with hand sanitizer gel.

After landing in Bariloche and getting the luggage, we all followed our team leader Sebas to the awaiting bus to the hotel. The weather was a little on the cool side. Now Bariloche is a winter resort town located on the west coast of Argentina adjacent to border with Chile in the region of Patagonia. The area is comprised of lakes, mountains, forests, grasslands (pampas) and desert...a scenic wonderland. Summer and winter outdoor activities are the attraction for folks from Argentina, Brazil and neighboring countries. Over the next days, we hiked up and down mountain trails, rode chair-lifts and gondolas, took boat ride to a scenic waterfall. The gals shopped in the local town as well as taking separate tours into the interior to see remote towns.

The highlight for me was a horseback ride into the pampas. A small group of 10 boarded the bus to a sheep ranch in the interior...way into the interior. After the bus left the highway onto a dirt road, I truly felt that this was Patagonia as it should be. After a bumpy ride which (con't next page)

felt like 2 tooth fillings had been jarred loose and I decided I really didn't need those last 2 vertebra anyway, we arrived at the sheep ranch. Now the sheep and cattle roam freely with the gauchos keeping an eye or two on them. The sheep ranch is a central location for the gauchos to resupply themselves after spending many days and nights on the pampas.

This ranch was also a spot to host touristas to introduce them to the life of a gaucho...but not so much the work part, just the eating part. After an introduction by the resident guide, we were taken to horses in the corral where each horse was assigned to each of the team members. So prior to this equestrian excursion, I had mentioned to folks that we take might apples for the horses as a treat. They agreed and we all left with pockets and bags bulging with apples from the hotel.

We all saddled up and like circus elephants nose to tail, followed the guides with a gaucho riding the sweep to make to sure no one falls behind....or falls off. The trail was thru brush and a creek and up and down some arroyos. The horses were docile enough but were primarily interested in getting back to the corral as soon as possible. In less than hour we arrived back at the ranch and de-saddled. It was at this point in time we happily extracted the apples and offered them to the ponies only to find that they simply weren't interested... at all! It turns out that the animals are free range and are let loose to feed themselves from the brush and whatever they can find, consequently, they had no clue what an apple was. If it didn't closely resemble a blade of grass, it wasn't on their menu.

Munching on our unappreciated apples, we then were led back to the dining room and informed that a typical gaucho style BBQ was to be served. Of course this meant more meat!...mutton, beef and sausage, along with salad and dessert. The food and drink were excellent and after a discussion of gaucho life and a musical interlude by one of the gauchos on an accordion, we jumped back on the bus.

Our next immediate excursion was a inflatable boat ride down a river. A 30 minute ride from the ranch brought us to the river bank where the large inflatable was set up for us. With a guide to steer and inform us of what to see, the boat slipped into the current and floated off. The current was mild, with no rapids and allowed us to coast along viewing the scenery, birdlife and enjoy the humorous narration of the guide. After about an hour, we pulled into the landing at a clubhouse where snacks and drinks were waiting for us. We hopped back on the bus and headed back to the hotel where we had to pack to get ready to leave back to Buenos Aries the next morning.

OK, now this was the reverse plane ride of the one that brought us here. Same 50 lb and 17 lb bags and stuff to haul back...same airplane...same sanitizing procedure. After settling in the seats. I thought all is well, until arose airplane nightmare scenario No. 2: a screaming baby...and behind me at that. Fortunately, I had a lpod with earbuds and the mother did attempt to calm the child and did so eventually.

Now we are back in humid Buenos Aires at the same hotel as before where we have a day and half to see more of the city. Only this time the core trip travelers have arrived from USA, meaning all 80 travelers are present at same place. That night we were all invited to a dinner in the city where menu was...you guessed it again...more meat...and still lots of it. We all had a great time meeting the new folks and food was great, however, I was pretty sure my left arm had started to go numb though. After the dinner, the gals had a evening reservation at a Tango show and enjoyed the time spent there.

The next day found us at the Eva (Duarte) Peron museum where the life of the wife of dictator Juan Peron was displayed by the presentation of various items depicting her tremendous impact on the Argentine people at the time. (Go to Google for the background). Upon her death at 33, the body was whisked away and hidden for many years due to fear of desecration. We later went to the cemetery where the body was later returned and interred in a mausoleum under 6 feet of concrete.

And so the big day had finally arrived, time to once again load the 50 lb and 17 lb bags and gear onto the bus and back to the airport for the 5 hour flight to **Ushuaia**, the capital of Tierra del Fuego, the southern most city in the world and the jump off point for the Antarctica peninsula.
