

The last race of the 2019 Long Beach Harbor Series, the "All Hands Race" was conducted by NYCLB on September 21, 2019. In the Spinnaker Class: Syndicate 1st, Dos Amigos Dos 2nd, Bilbo Baggins 3rd and the best finish by a NYCLB boat was Renegade in 4th. The non-spin winner was the Fiat Lux. The winner of the Long Beach Harbor High Point Series was Syndicate. Fiat Lux was in 2nd, Dos Amigos was 3rd and the best place Navy boat was Raptor in 4th.

Our next and last NYCLB race of 2019 will be the Navy Day Regatta on Saturday, 19 October.

In other race series around the harbor NYCLB boats made their marks in the race results.

In the Seal Beach YC Pop-Top (four race) Series 5, in PHRF D, Paul Turang in Dawn Patrol was second with 6 points (1,3,2, (DNF)). In PHRF C, Ben Smith in Renegade won with 5 points ((3), 1,3,1). And in PHRF B, Heinz Butner in Raptor won with 3 points ((1), 1,1,1). Also, in the overall awards for the combined five series, Chris Mewes in Shadowfax won in PHRF B and won the Bahia Marine Hardware Cup (Most Improved Boat) award.

We are not done wining yet - in the three Wet Wednesday (six races each) Series at Long Beach YC, Heinz Butner in Raptor won PHRF A for Series 1, Series 2 and was second in Series 3.

Tuesday's Salty Sailors sailing continues - we will sail year-round. If you don't have a sailing vessel just bring yourself, bring you friends and family – there is always a skipper in need of crew. We meet at the club any Tuesday at 11:30. The club website has the most recent NYCLB Senior Salty Sailors course chart. Gather up your friends and family and join us.

The Tuesday SS results follow:

Tuesday 3 September: We had four boats on course # 6, a 6.7-mile cruise of the Long Beach Harbor. The wind ranged from 8 to 14 knot.

Our first leg was a beat up to the east end of the measured mile rounding Mark 31 to starboard, from there we paralleled the "wall" rounding Mark 30, at the west end of the measured mile, to starboard heading off on a reach to Mark 27, the Long Beach center channel buoy. The next leg was downwind to Mark 34 by the Belmont Pier, next we headed on off on a tight reach to Mark 38, at the east end of Island Chaffee, rounding to port and on to the finish at the A Buoy at the entrance to Alamitos Bay.

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In first place Shadowfax, followed by Fait Lux, Macs and Windhaven.

Tuesday 10 September: For this race we had five boats on course # 57, a 7.3 mile east to west cruise of the Long Beach Harbor. The wind ranged from 8 to 18 knots.

Our first leg was a tight reach to Mark 35 at the Seal Beach Pier, from there we head completely across the harbor on a tight reach to Mark 27, the Long Beach center channel buoy. The next leg, a fast reach, took us up to the wall and back across the bay to Mark 31, the east end measured mile marker. From there we headed off on broad reach to the finish at the A Buoy at the Alamitos Bay entrance.

In first place Shadowfax, followed by Windhaven, Raptor, Swell Lover and Lucky Boy.

Tuesday 17 September: On this Tuesday we had five boats on course # 12, a 5.7-mile sightseeing cruise of the Long Beach Harbor. The wind ranged from 5.0 to 9.0 knots.

Our first leg was a beat out to the center mile marker on the breakwater, Mark 37, from there we headed off on a reach to Mark 27, the Long Beach center channel buoy R "2". Our next leg of the tour was a broad reach/run to the Belmont Pier, Mark 34. We continued down the beach on a tight reach to Mark 32 at the west end of the Alamitos Bay jetty then on to the finish at the Alamitos Bay entrance A Buoy.

In first place, doing a HORIZON JOB on the fleet, Green Dragon followed by Shadowfax, Windhaven, Swell Lover and Lucky Boy.

Tuesday 24 September: We had three boats on course # 60 with the finish at the A Buoy, an 8.3-mile sail. The wind ranged from 8 to 19.0 knots.

Our first leg was a beat out to the east end mile marker on the breakwater, Mark 31, from there we headed off on a tight reach to Mark 35, at the Seal Beach Pier. Then we took off on a long reach across the bay to Island Grissom, Mark 39. From Grissom we passed Mark 38 to port on our way to the extended finish at the A Buoy.

In first place, Shadowfax, followed by Raptor and somewhere in the distance Lucky Boy.



Member's Corner

Onde Amo's 2019 Transpac Summary

To prepare for the 2019 Transpac, most of the crew spent the last 12 months campaigning Onde Amo in different races up and down the California coast to prepare for the 2019 Transpac. We took first place in our class in the 2018 Santa Barbara to King Harbor race, fifth place in the 2019 Newport to Cabo race, and first place in Division A in the 2019 Around Catalina to Dana Pt. race. We felt well prepared for the 2019 Transpac race.

Our start of the 2019 Transpac began at 1300 on Wednesday, July 10th. It was a clear, sunny day with good wind. We started with the #2 genoa and almost cleared the West end of Catalina without a single tack, but not quite. We ended up making a couple of tacks to clear the West end and then continued West.

Onde Amo is well equipped with electronic navigation equipment. She has a laptop mounted to the navigation station with Expedition software and satellite communications. Expedition can recommend the best route based on the most recent grib files that are downloaded via satellite. The weather forecasts indicated light winds near the rhumb line. So, we headed South.

We continued sailing with the #2 genoa for the first couple of days, but by Day 3 we were able to hoist the A3 spinnaker. Each spinnaker on Onde Amo has received a nickname from the crew. The A3 is called Sammi. Short for Samurai. We were making good time flying Sammi, but later the same day Sammi blew. The conditions were appropriate for that sail and we had no idea why at the time. We recovered what was left of Sammi and launched the A2. Better known as Good and Plenty.

About 2300 on day 3, the helmsman reported that he had no helm. This was an issue that we have some experience with. During the 2018 Newport to Ensenada race we lost helm control. So, we were quite familiar with the mechanical design of Onde Amo's steering system. In the 2018 N2E, the steering cable itself separated and there was nothing we could do to repair it at sea. In this case, the steering cable was a bit worn, but intact. We quickly realized that the clamp that secured the steering cable to the helm had come loose. We searched the bilge and we were able to locate and reinstall the missing clamp. Helm control was restored in less than an hour and we continued South. The next day we received the report that OEX had incurred major rudder damage and had sunk.

The first five days were quite wet and cold. Sometime during Day 6, the conditions began to improve and we were able to start removing layers of foul weather gear. We had been flying Good and Plenty, but it was about this time that the A2 blew up. The wind had shifted far enough aft that we were able to hoist the 1.5-ounce symmetrical spinnaker. This spinnaker was so heavy duty that it was referred to as Thor! We continued sailing under Thor and by Day 7 had passed the halfway point.

At approximately 2200 on day 9 the helmsman was caught off guard by a wave and the boat was knocked off track. The chute collapsed and before the helm could recover it wrapped itself around the forestay. During the effort to free the wrapped spinnaker, the boat was hit hard by another wave and knocked over to the point that the deck was close to vertical. We had been sailing with the mainsail secured with a preventer. Because of the preventer, the main could not swing to relieve the pressure holding the boat over. A crew member ended up having to cut the preventer to allow the boom to cross the boat. Once the boom crossed, the boat sat right back up and we were left trying to figure out what just happened. After everything calmed down, we took another look at unwrapping the spinnaker. Conditions had become quite rough; and because of the darkness, the decision was made to leave the spinnaker until day break. We sailed the remainder of that night under mainsail alone.









The next morning, we spent several hours trying to free Thor, but nothing worked. In the light of day, we could see that Thor had wrapped so tightly the foil on the headstay was broken in several places. The foil has two tracks that are used to secure the luff tape of the headsails. We quickly realized that we would have to free fly any headsail that we wanted to raise. In the meantime, we were still sailing a course that would allow us to fly another spinnaker. The A2 had been repaired by now and a discussion had begun about changing its nickname to Franken Good or Franken Plenty. We were able to launch the A2 with the new nickname still undecided.

In addition to the knockdown, we had multiple equipment failures. The steering failure I mentioned earlier, charging failure, engine failure, fresh water pump failure, instrument lighting failure, and even a complete instrument failure. The charging failure turned out to be a bad amp meter. The meter indicated we were not charging the batteries, but some quick troubleshooting discovered that the system was actually charging the batteries. The engine failure turned out to be air in the fuel system. The fresh water pump failure was an actual failure. In this case, we decided to utilize the water maker to make 3 gallons of water at a time and keep the fresh water in the tanks as an emergency reserve. The instrument failure was caused by a short in the radar system. Because we removed the radar before the race, we were able to disconnect that system and the instruments were back in operation. We managed to repair each failure and keep moving towards Honolulu.

By Day 12 we had less than 200 miles to go and we were feeling confident about a 4th place finish. However, late that same day we once again lost helm control. An inspection showed that the steering system on board was intact and the decision was made to inspect the rudder. We equipped a crew member with fins and a dive mask and secured him to the boat with a line. A quick dive revealed we had lost the rudder. Part of the required equipment for the Transpac is an emergency rudder. Our emergency rudder was a stainless-steel contraption that mounts to the stern of the boat. The emergency rudder is controlled by a pipe serving as the tiller. This arrangement has a limited range of motion and the emergency rudder is less than half the size of the boat's rudder. It quickly became apparent the emergency rudder couldn't control the boat very well in big seas. We tried numerous sail plans, but nothing improved the control of the emergency rudder. The last resort was to motor the remaining distance, which meant dropping out of the race. We notified the race committee, the U.S. Coast Guard, and Vessel Assist.

The original intent was to motor to Honolulu. However, because we were still having problems controlling the boat and because we were so far South, the decision was made to head to Molokai. We made landfall in Molokai on Day 13. We spent one night in Molokai and we were towed from Molokai to Honolulu on Day 14. Finishing the trip in almost exactly 14 days.

Onde Amo remains in Honolulu, awaiting shipment back to the mainland for repairs. It was a great disappointment to everyone on board to not finish the race, but we learned a lot about ourselves and our ability to overcome setbacks.


