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





Discover the different types of rope and their uses

A good marine knot should be easy to tie, easy to untie and hold fast under the conditions for which it's intended. Knot tying is part of the practice of marlinespike seamanship, which is the general knowledge of knots and the care of rope. The term originates from a pointed metal tool, a marlinespike, used in working with rope.

When aboard a boat, a rope is generally called a line. There are three ways to tie a line:

- **Knot**—a general term for securing a line to an object, another line or to itself. Specifically, a knot is tied in a single line.
- Bend—a type of knot used to tie one line to another
- Hitch—a type of knot used to secure a line to an object

Types of rope:

The three most common types of synthetic rope used today are nylon, polyester and polypropylene. It's important to buy the correct rope for the intended use.

Nylon rope is strong and has good resistance to chafing and rubbing. It can stretch considerably (up to 20 percent) without damage to its fibers. This shock-absorbing quality makes it ideal for anchor, mooring and dock lines. Nylon rope wears well, resists mildew and rot but doesn't float. Three-strand nylon line is preferred for dock lines since it stretches enough to dampen the shock of wave action and wind against cleats.

Polyester rope is about 10 percent weaker than nylon rope of the same diameter. It stretches very little, which makes it suitable for halyards and other sailboat rigging, towing line, and other applications where you don't want stretch to interfere. It chafes easily, so check it often, and use chafe protection as needed.

Polypropylene rope is light and costs less than the other synthetic ropes. It lacks the strength of the other two and is slippery, which increases the chance that a knot will fail. Polypropylene also deteriorates more rapidly in sunlight. Its fibers tend to fray and break, and it can break under high stress. However, polypropylene floats, which reduces the risk of the line wrapping around a propeller and makes it ideal for towing dinghies and water-skiers. It's not good for dock lines because its hard surface tends to slip off cleats, and it can cause cuts if it runs free through your hands.

Every skipper needs to know how to tie a few basic knots, including the cleat hitch and bowline. Learn how to tie a cleat hitch.



For the start of the 2020 racing season, we have completed four of five races of the Saturday Sailors Series. Navy boats participating are; Dawn Patrol, Renegade, Shadowfax, and Raptor. Currently in PHRF A, Raptor is in 1st place and Shadowfax is in 4th. In PHRF B, Renegade is in 5th. In PHRF C Dawn Patrol is in 2nd. The scores for the first four boats in the A fleet are close. With one more race and with a through-out score the final results will certainly get scrambled!

The SCYA Midwinter Regatta was conducted 8-9 February. The only NYCLB boat racing was the J109 Raptor. As a "reward" for finishing first in the "B fleet" last year, they put Raptor in the A Fleet this year. Result? Raptor finished 5th (last) in the A Fleet.

Tuesday's Salty Sailors sailing continues - we will sail year-round. If you don't have a sailing vessel just bring yourself, bring you friends and family – there is always a skipper in need of crew. We meet at the the club any Tuesday at 11:30. The club website has the most recent NYCLB Senior Salty Sailors course chart.

The Tuesday SS results follow:

Tuesday 4 February: Well, not every day in southern California is a great sailing day. No race.

Tuesday 11 February: Last week, we had five boats on course #52, a 6.5 mile a "breakwater to beach cruise". The wind ranged, reported by the sailors, from 2.2, reported by Macs to 17.0 knots, reported by Callisto.

Our first leg was beat out to Mark #31 on the east end of the breakwater, from there we crossed the bay on a tight reach towards the beach, rounding Mark #39 to starboard, heading off on broad reach along the beach to Mark #32 rounding it to starboard on a beat to the finish at Mark #38. We saw lots of large dolphins during the race.

In first place, with a horizon job on the fleet, Windhaven followed by Callisto, Macs, Fait Lux and bring up the rear Shadowfax.

Tuesday 18 February: We had three boats on course #20, a 7.8-mile harbor cruise. The wind ranged, from 5.0 to 10.0 knots, reported by Raptor.

Our first leg was beat out to Mark #36, at the west end of the breakwater, rounding it to starboard. On the second leg, we headed off on a broad reach, avoiding a Thums barge, on the way to Mark #27, the Long Beach R2 center channel buoy. The third leg was a broad reach/run to Mark #34 at the Belmont Pool. The fourth leg was a reach along the beach to Mark #32, Raptor and Shadowfax started "jousting" on this leg. The fifth leg, a beat out to Mark #38 is where the real fun stated; with Raptor rounding Mark #32 two boat lengths in front of Shadowfax a tacking duel between the two boats started, back and forth these two boats tack all the way out to Mark #38 on the last tack into Mark #38 Shadowfax was ahead by a nose, rounding the mark and heading off on a broad reach to the finish at the A buoy.

In first place, Shadowfax followed by Raptor and Windhaven.

GREEN DRAGON 2's ILL-FATED MEXICO VOYAGE

Part I - San Diego to La Paz

Mexico's Sea of Cortez is a treacherous place to cruise in the wintertime. The winter weather is dominated by winds known as "Northers". These are strong north to north-west winds. They flow down the hundreds of miles length of the Sea of Cortez, which lies between the western Mexican mainland and the eastern, "inside" side of the Baja peninsula. The Northers often reach 20 to 25 knots plus, with speeds at the higher end typically at the islands that dot the Sea. Occasionally, there is a day or two of lighter weather, but these "weather windows" are few and far between. What makes the Northers particularly dangerous are the large, short-period wind-driven waves that form from the long fetch of the Sea. Waves of 2 meters and more (6 feet plus) can form only 3 to 5 seconds apart. These short period waves can cause a boat to be violently slammed around. As a cruising guide puts it, "For larger boats this generally makes for a long and rough travel day, but for smaller boats, it can be a dangerous situation" (Breeding & Bansmer, "Sea of Cortez", 2nd Ed.). While we had a "larger" boat of 44 feet LOA, this situation proved not merely uncomfortable, but physically dangerous to our boat and life threating for us.

"Green Dragon 2" was a Beneteau First 44.7 sailboat, commissioned in 2005. We were her second owners. We raced and cruised her extensively for ten years, including numerous Newport to Ensenada races and several Channel Islands cruises. We had both previously sailed to Cabo as crew on another Baja Ha Ha boat and took our prior boat as far as Puerto Vallarta, all without incident. This time was to be very different.

We had left on our voyage to Mexico in November, 2019, at the usual end of hurricane season. But tropical storms don't always follow the "usual" pattern, as we were soon to learn. From the start, bad weather and multiple, cascading equipment failures did not augur well for our voyage. We had originally set out from San Diego as part of the Baja Ha Ha, an annual cruising rally. Two days into our trip down the Baja's Pacific coast our chart plotter broke, which was our only means of receiving AIS positions (of vessels so equipped). At the same time, our compass light went out, making following a course in the pitch-dark night a challenge. Not knowing if the chart plotter could be repaired in Mexico (it could not), I elected to return to San Diego for repairs. Our original, Ha Ha crew departed. The compass light was re-wired and the chart plotter was repaired and a re-mounted at the helm using a jury-rig (our original mount was destroyed). This was facilitated by the great hospitality shown us by Silver Gate Yacht Club.

We set out for Mexico again, this time with just Rosalie and me double-handing. No longer being a part of the Ha Ha, we were required to clear Mexican customs at Ensenada, which was done quite efficiently. We then had an uneventful two day and night sail to Turtle Bay, which is about half-way down the Pacific Baja coast. That was to be our last peaceful passage.

After leaving Turtle Bay, we headed directly to Cabo San Lucas. We were by then four days behind the Baja Ha Ha fleet. As such, we were told there would be plenty of slips at Cabo as the Ha Ha boats would have left Cabo by then. Wrong. We ran into the tail end of late season tropical storm Raymond, which came up to Cabo from the south. Due to the heavy rainfall and seas from that storm, our chart plotter failed a second time due to water intrusion. Right on cue, our auto pilot also failed. Having no auto pilot for a double handed crew means having to hand steer for 24 hours a day for hundreds of miles, a tiring proposition.



As a result of tropical storm Raymond, the harbor at Cabo was closed by the Port Captain to all outbound traffic. As the Ha Ha fleet was still in harbor, all the slips were taken and anchoring was prohibited. We had arrived on a Monday which was a Mexican holiday, and even the gas dock was closed. However, they opened the pumps for us and allowed us to stay overnight on the gas dock if we agreed to leave by 6 am the next day, which we did. We then proceeded 20 miles up the coast to the marina at San Jose del Cabo, where they honored our slip reservation even though we were a few days early. The helpful local boatyard repaired our auto pilot and our mainsail's broken lazy jacks.

Many cruising articles talk at length about the "Baja Bash" which is the return trip up the Pacific coast of Baja before the start of the next Hurricane season, in May-June. It is called a "bash" because you are sailing (usually motoring) upwind into strong winds and closely spaced large seas. What those articles don't usually talk about is this: virtually all passages in the Sea of Cortez in winter are a "bash". This was amply so on the passage from San Jose del Cabo to La Paz. Just like the conditions on the "outside" (Pacific) coast of Baja, the strong northerly winds and closely spaced large seas on the "inside" (Sea of Cortez) Baja coast made this a miserable trip. This passage is made worse by having to traverse the channel between the Baja coast and Cerrvalo Island which creates a Venturi effect of higher wind speeds and bigger waves.

We waited ten days in San Jose del Cabo for a weather window for the estimated three-day upwind passage to La Paz, via two overnight anchorages and a 3rd day for a daylight run down the gauntlet of the sometimes confusing La Paz channel. The 3-day weather window never arrived. We and another boat made the upwind "bash" to La Paz in two days, including an overnight sail and spending an unsettling night at the windy, bumpy anchorage aptly named *Muertos* ("dead" in Spanish).


We stayed for a month and a half at Marina de La Paz, in downtown La Paz. The marina has its own friendly clubhouse (Club Cruceros), wired internet and potable water dockside (a rarity in Mexican marinas). We initially had visions of doing what most cruisers dream of – using our marina as just a base, going out and anchoring at the nearby islands, landing our dinghy on white sandy beaches, and exploring. That quickly proved to be a fantasy. Daily weather reports in La Paz on the cruisers net were typically 10-15 knot northerly winds, but with the caveat that winds at the nearby islands were 5 kts. higher and gusts could be 5 kts. on top of that, plus the usual big, short period seas. That meant that the wind most of the time at the islands was in the 20-25 kts, range plus big seas. On several days during our stay in La Paz, the harbor was closed by the Port Captain to outbound traffic with big fines for violators. Once during our stay at the marina, we heard of a catamaran going up on the rocks when a change of wind direction to the west turned a nearby anchorage into a lee shore. We stayed the entire month and a half tied up at the marina.

We originally planned to explore the Sea of Cortez in the winter. After facing the reality of the weather situation, and with the concurrence of experienced local cruisers, we decided to head south to the Mexican mainland and return to the Sea of Cortez in the Spring, when better weather in the Sea was expected. However, the passage to the Mexican mainland required crossing the southern end of the Sea of Cortez. Our decision to do so proved to be our boat's undoing and nearly our own demise.

You Can Protect Our Waterways by Becoming a Dockwalker

Who are DOCKWALKERS?

Dockwalkers are partners who inspire and educate boaters and other recreators to be safe and environmentally sound while boating in California. These partners distribute boater kits with educational materials while visiting marinas, boat launch ramps, boat shows and events. If you are already a trained Dockwalker and were trained more than 3 years ago, please join us next year for a refresher class. Anyone from 16-100 years young can become a Dockwalker.

How Do Dockwalkers Help?

The efforts of Dockwalkers increase boater awareness about clean and safe boating, thus improving the recreation experience in California while helping to preserve its precious wildlife habitat and water quality. There are over 600 Dockwalkers statewide who have distributed more than 90,000 boater kits since 2000.

How Do I Become a DOCKWALKER?

People interested in becoming Dockwalkers are required to attend a FREE 1.5 hour training class. During the class participants learn about potential sources of boat pollution and their impact, environmental regulations for boaters, and clean boating practices that prevent pollution from boating. In addition, the training provides information on how to conduct Dockwalking and an overview of the educational materials Dockwalkers will distribute including the boater kits. Age range is 15 years and up. The program can document community service hours. Contact the Division of Boating and Waterways and the California Coastal Commission's Boating Clean and Green Program at (415) 904-6905; vmatuk@coastal.ca.gov or visit www.BoatingCleanandGreen.com to register for a class.

What Is a Boater Kit?

The <u>boater kit</u> is an educational tool for boaters. Items include: a pocketbook of tide tables, Division of Boating and Waterways pamphlets (*ABC's of the California Boating Law*), oil absorbent pillow with reusable zip tie and instructions, and more. Depending on your region, we may also provide the Delta Clean Boating map and/or the San Francisco Bay Area Clean Boating Map and the new edition of the Southern California Boater's Guide. Boaters can receive a boater kit after completing a brief boater questionnaire/pledge. This questionnaire will help to identify gaps in environmental services and better target future boater education efforts.

How Can I Order the Boater Kits?

After the class we will be mailing you some boater kits. If you are a very active Dockwalker and need more boater kits, please contact the Division of Boating and Waterways and the California Coastal Commission's Boating Clean and Green Program at (415) 904-6905 or vmatuk@coastal.ca.gov.

What is a Recreational Boater Questionnaire/Pledge?

All boaters who receive a boater kit must complete a brief and anonymous <u>Recreational Boater Questionnaire/Pledge</u>. The information is used to improve the Program, better understand boater behavior and identify gaps in terms of safe and clean boating education and services.

What is the Dockwalker Contest?

In recognition of the good work and dedication of our clean boating Dockwalkers, the top Dockwalkers who return the most number of completed boaters questionnaire will be honored with great awards donated to our partners and will join the ranks in the Dockwalker Hall of Fame. Dockwalkers will be asked to collect their boater questionnaires and return them after finishing their Dockwalking activities.

How Marina/Yacht Clubs Benefit from Becoming Dockwalkers?

Marina/Yacht operators and staff believe that education is critical to successfully operating a clean boating facility and minimizing water quality impacts. Becoming a Dockwalker or having a staff person or yacht club members trained as Dockwalkers will provide you with the educational materials and tools to work with your tenants and visitors as partners in the clean marina/yacht club, clean water effort. This program provides marinas with points towards the clean marina designation. Participation in the DOCKWALKER PROGRAM counts towards the nomination of the Club of the Year under the community service category.
