


They've read the book. Now what?


REFLECTION QUESTIONS

- ★ What was the main point of the book?
- ★ Why do you think this book would help other people?
- ★ What did you like or not like about how the main character dealt with the problem?
- ★ Are there things you would have done differently from the main character?
- ★ Now that you've read this book, how would you deal with this problem?
- ★ Have you ever faced a situation like this? What did you do?
- ★ When you first discovered the problem presented in this book, how did it make you feel?
- ★ Is there anything you would add or change in the story to make it even better?
- ★ What would you do differently now that you've read this book and learned about this problem?
- ★ How would you encourage others to step up and make changes to make this problem go away?

FOLLOW-UP ASSIGNMENTS

- ★ Write a "book-fommercial" to persuade other kids to read this book.
- ★ Record a "book review" on your phone, telling people why they should or should not read it.
- ★ Draw a poster encouraging other kids to read this book.
- ★ Write a poem about the book.
- ★ Illustrate a book cover different from what is on your book.
- ★ Pretend you are the author and writing a second book in this series. What should happen?
- ★ Create a theme song with lyrics for the book.
- ★ Write a letter to a character in the story.
- ★ Make a comic strip of the story. Include at least three frames.
- ★ Create a panel made up of kids who read the book. Ask the rest of the class to act like reporters.
- ★ Create a collage of magazine pictures or draw a picture of your favorite part of the book. Use it to help explain why you liked this part so much.
