PROGRAM NOTES

The most vivid memory I have of *Silent Night* took place during a Christmas Eve service at my Father-in-Law's Methodist church. At the conclusion of the service the choir began singing this carol, and were eventually joined be all of us there. The lights were turned off, the chapel illuminated by the warm glow of candles held by all of the congregants.

Growing up Jewish (and continuing to be so), I'd never experienced anything quite like that in a worship service. It was lovely and extremely peaceful.

I've attempted to capture the warmth of that moment in this treatment of *Silent Night*. I have found that this arrangement is particularly effective when used as a concert closer.

Incidentally, I have a related arrangement of Silent Night for saxophone quartet that you may also enjoy.

REHEARSAL & PERFORMANCE NOTES

Before I put pencil to paper on this arrangement, I already knew that it had to be a capella

I also knew that it had to be in common time. Why? I don't know. Probably for the same reason ('ve adapted several 4/4 tune intos '3'

The biggest issues in this piece tend to be intonation and balance. Encourage your musicians to listen, listen, listen to the ensemble, allowing themselves to become enveloped by the lush sounds around them. Open ears generally take care of these problems.

The harmonic influence is from Bob Mintzer, a mentor of mine. I had just completed the copywork for one of his saxophone quartets when I wrote this treatment of *Silent Night*. Bob's harmonic approach was fresh in my mind, and I recall using this arrangement to test out some of the things I learned when dissecting his score(s).

Rick Hirsch is an award-winning composer who apprenticed with **Bob Mintzer** and **Toshiko Akiyoshi**, serving each as their personal music copyist. He lives in State College, PA.
