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
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Using This Teacher Guide

Features: The suggested weekly schedule enclosed has easy-to-manage lessons that guide the reading, worksheets, and all assessments. The pages of this guide are perforated and three-hole punched so materials are easy to tear out, hand out, grade, and store. Teachers are encouraged to adjust the schedule and materials as needed in order to best work within their unique educational program.

Lesson Scheduling: Students are instructed to read the pages in their book and then complete the corresponding section provided by the teacher. Assessments that may include worksheets, activities, quizzes, and tests are given at regular intervals with space to record each grade. Space is provided on the weekly schedule for assignment dates, and flexibility in scheduling is encouraged. Teachers may adapt the scheduled days per each unique student situation. As the student completes each assignment, this can be marked with an "X" in the box.



Course Description: *My Story, My Country, My World* is a lower elementary social studies course. The subject of social studies for this age is diverse, and includes introductions to history, politics, economics, sociology, and geography, with the ultimate aim of teaching a comprehensive understanding of God's world and the cultures of each country. *My Story* is an adventure-based curriculum that encourages families to explore the world together through four quests, and to understand it better from God's perspective. It is designed with elements that make weekly learning fun and interactive. This book will guide children from their homes out into the world, where they will meet people from various nations so they can better understand them. Ultimately, *My Story* guides children to better appreciate their own world and their own lives as they learn of God's world and His great love.

Course Objectives: Students completing this course will

- ✓ Seek to know more of God's wondrous love as they learn about His world
- ✓ Identify types of governments and country flags
- Express thanks to God each day for all that He gives to us
- → Discover Italian and Chinese words to help begin laying a foundation for life-long language learning

- ✓ Reveal their own world in a journal they maintain while going through each week
- ✓ Understand a map of the world as they follow their journey across the globe
- Explore God's creation and what He teaches us every day through His world

Charting Your Course:

The following are the teaching elements you will find in this social studies curriculum. Teachers are free to adapt the studies to the abilities and skills of each student.

Talk time!	Narration is a form of instruction where students talk or tell what they've learned in a lesson or respond to information they've learned and apply it to life situations. Talk time is often started with a question, either about the lesson or about a student's life experience.
Copywork time!	For those learning to write, this is an opportunity to learn to write and spell words mentioned in the lesson.
Activity time!	Some activities are included in the lesson and can be done that day, while others may suggest a trip to the library or making something for a snack, etc., at a later time. The teacher can use his or her discretion about whether an activity might or might not be done.
Language time!	In level two, each lesson includes a word or phrase from a different language (Italian in the first semester and Chinese in the second semester). Children are at a prime developmental level for language learning at this age. Find pronunciation helps online, including translate.google.com.
WORD find time.	Whether forward or down, let kids have fun finding the words hidden in the letters. You might have them say the letters as they circle them to help with remembering them. And if they can't find one, that's okay. The answers are in the back!
thankful%time!	When we have a thankful heart, we live in a deeper place of God's joy. This daily time of giving thanks is meant for the students to consider all the wonderful people and things around them they can be thankful for. Get some posterboard and colored cardstock and create a thankful tree, adding what you are thankful for each day on a leaf cut from colored card stock. At the end of the year, it will be filled with leaves! See sample in the back on page 410!
Flagitime!	Artistic expression at any age creates an emotional connection to the learning experience. In level two, the focus is on country flags and what the symbols and colors mean. Students will study a country flag each week and then color the flag provided. Flag information is from the www.cia.gov site.
Government Time!	This once-a-week lesson follows Flag time! The type of government that is represented by the country's flag is briefly discussed. Also, students are encouraged to take a moment for their 1 Timothy 2:1-2 prayer for leaders of that particular country.
S CREATION E	Throughout the Bible, there are passages that show God's wondrous creation of animals of every kind and what lessons they might teach us about Him and ourselves to help us live more wisely. His world is amazing!



At the end of each week, students are instructed to find the **yellow highlighted** words for their Word Collector (which you can create from anything as simple as a bag or shoebox). They will go back over the week's pages and write those words on 3 x 5 cards. Their teachers will help them either read the words or spell them if their teacher says them out loud. This is a vital part of their course reviews.



At the end of each lesson is a My Story Journal where students will help write their own life and history for the year. Weekly prompts give them information to log in their journals, including things from their birthdates to favorite foods and more. Feel free to add things not asked by the initial prompts.

Review time!

Every Friday becomes a week in review, looking back over what was learned with a focus on the Quest Word Collector words.

Quest in Review Time!

On the last Friday of every 9-week quest, the week in review becomes a quest in review time! These reviews and answers are in the back of the book.

Language Time Review!

At the end of each semester, students are prompted to gather up all their language words (semester one is Italian and semester two is Chinese). A teacher can help quiz them on the meaning of their new-found words! 3 x 5 cards work great!

Quest Collector Card!

Each Quest Collector Card has clue questions to keep students alert to what they're learning. It may be looking for the name of the smallest country in the world or the name of the longest river in Europe. The answers and where they are located are found in the back of the book. Make sure to read your Quest Collector Card before the quest begins. Tear out each card as you begin a new quest!

Welcome to four new quests that will take you around God's world! Your first adventure will be starting soon.


This book adventure is going to help you learn about something called social studies. Social studies is about people and places around the world, including your own neighbors and your own family. We will talk about what people eat, where the food comes from, how governments are set up, the symbols on flags of different countries and what they mean, how God teaches us to love the people of the world like He does, and much more.

Before we get started on the first quest, let's talk really quickly about maps. What is a map? Maps are pictures that mirror the real world in small ways. They are drawings of what the world looks like from above so you can find different places you want to go. You might make a map of your house (often called a blueprint), every room like a square or rectangle, with doorways showing how to go from room to room. Then maybe you could make a map of your neighborhood, then your city, then your state, then your country, and finally the world, showing mountains, rivers, lakes, and more. A map of the world is like the map of your house, with each country like a room, only showing much, much more! Earth is fairly round, like a ball, but maps of the earth are usually made flat unless you have a globe!



Long ago, when you needed to find a city or a building in that city, you might use a compass to guide you. The compass was first invented around A.D.

1100 in China. It is designed to point north so one can figure all other directions, south, east, and west. An astrolabe is an amazing device first invented by the ancient Greek people. It showed how the sun, moon, planets, and stars moved



Let's Get Ready to See the World... by Canoe!

Time to get ready because your year of adventure is beginning!

Grab your **Quest** 1 map so you can follow your journey each step of the way. In this first week we'll be riding in a canoe, so watch for canoes each day, and make sure you strap on your life **jacket**. And as they say in Brazil before an adventure, *Boa viagem*, which means good trip!

Our **canoe** might be similar to the ones used by the Polynesians when they first found Hawaii! Hawaii is a group of islands that became the 50th state of the United States in 1959. Have you ever met a person who lived outside of your state or country? Almost immediately you might **see** small differences in how they talk, act, and think.

Do you want to know when a lot of those differences began? Well, let's look at something in the Bible that happened a very long time ago at the **Tower** of Babel. You can read the whole account in the book of Genesis 11:1–9. Our ancestors were originally all from areas called the Middle East and Northern Africa, which you can see on your map. Remember, north on a map is up, south is down, **east** is right, and west is left. At that time, people were all united as one culture. One day, however, the people grew proud and decided to build a tower to heaven, so they could be like God. This upset God, and He stopped them from building the tower by making them speak different languages.



The people could no longer **talk** to each other then, only to those who spoke their language. These folks could be thought of in some ways as the first nations. The **people** groups who spoke the same language all went together to another place of the world to live in a village or city.

It's partly because of this that our modern world is here and why we don't all think and act alike. Your own town and country are some of the many that have come together since the Tower of Babel, so understanding the beauty and uniqueness of people around the world is important to better appreciate God's whole world.

Now, the earth has big pieces of land or areas we call continents. There are seven continents, which are North

America, South America, Europe, Asia, Africa, Oceania, and Antarctica. We'll be visiting all but Antarctica. On the six other continents are found all the countries of the world. Some countries are very **big** and some are very **small.** What makes a country is being under a single government or leadership. The smallest country is called Vatican City and is actually inside the city of Rome. The biggest country in the world is Russia, which covers 11 different time zones and takes eight days to travel across by train!





Let's go on over to **Hawaii** to better understand people in the Pacific islands. Come on! Hawaii is a group of over a hundred volcanic islands in the Pacific Ocean. There have been people on these islands for over a thousand years. In the early days of Hawaiian government, they had **chiefs** that ruled over the four main islands. At that time, they settled the land but no one owned it.



The largest one, the great **Pyramid** at Giza, took around 20 years to build and about 400,000 people to build it. There on the water you can see *feluccas*, which are boats that move by sails and oars along the Nile River, and they have been around in a similar form since the time of the pyramids, too. Many tourists love to **travel** on these since they are very peaceful.

of the earth. It showed much
of his world, but he did not
even know about North

amazing at the time!



It's time to tell you about the lost **library**. There was a very large library in Alexandria, Egypt, that disappeared around A.D. 642. This was considered the

greatest library of the time, with lots of rare books,

inventions, philosophy, science, and more. Alexandria is Egypt's second-largest city and major harbor. It was the center of the spice trade when gold and silver were exchanged for spices. People liked tasty food then, too!

Want to eat like an Egyptian? It's not hard! The modern meals there are mainly vegetarian, with

legumes like beans, peas, and lentils, and also grains and vegetables. Meat has often been too expensive to add to most meals, though fresh and other seafood is loved by many in the seaside cities. Alexandria is on the Mediterranean Sea, so if there is a

special feast or celebration, fish is often the food to serve!





And when you need a cheerful Egyptian greeting at meal time, say, "Bel 'hana we el'shefa," which means "Wishing you eat this meal in joy (hana) and may it bring healing (shefa) for you."




