

The cat's out of the bag

... and in the kitchen, on the bed, the couch and the rug. Here are some tips on how to make your home a more feline-friendly place to live - for all involved

p until the moment a now seven-year-old exotic shorthair named Coco ("Choccy") came into my family's life, I was not a cat fan. Now, of course, he is a very important and much-loved member of the family who adores the attention we give him and has created a bond with our daughter that is amazing.

The rule of thumb is that cats are "easier" to live with than dogs, given they are self-sufficient, don't need to be taken for walks, bathe themselves and know their way around a litter box. But there's the small issue of hair (they can shed, a lot), vomit (they like to do it) and claws, which can turn a lovely couch into a torn, threadbare shell of its former self.

Many people aren't fond of cats owing to the belief they are responsible for the death of native birds and animals. It doesn't take too much research to find out the majority of that damage is done by feral cats - not house cats - but either way... let's discuss how to make your house a little more accommodating for cats and, vice versa, your neighbourhood a little safer from them.

Cats by nature are a lot more active at night and for their own safety should not be allowed to wander after the sun goes down. One way to achieve this, if your cat is not entirely an indoor moggie, is to consider a netted cat run. With access via an open window, this allows your pet a way to get a bit of sun and freedom in the fresh air. A wire-rope cable system is the most common method of attaching netting to hard surfaces, such as brickwork

cement and Colorbond fences. It's also the method employed for the majority of professionally installed enclosures. It's cost effective, gives a neat finish and requires little drilling.

There are also free-standing portable cat enclosures that are quick and easy to assemble; I highly recommend looking on catnets.com.au for one.

Dr Chris - who doles out helpful advice at drool.pet - is always saying a scratch pole with a high perch point gives your cat a sense of belonging, and it keeps them from

tearing up the furniture or carpeting. Additionally, window hammocks for cats, which attach to panes with suction cups, allow them to do their favourite thing take a nap in the sunlight – both safely and adorably.

Cat Containment Laws & Curfews

In February 2021, a Parliamentary Report provided a framework on protecting wildlife and reducing the impact of cats. Veterinary clinics and other organisations are now working together with their local communities to help educate cat owners about the issue and their responsibilities.

Cat containment and the protection of wildlife and the wellbeing of cats is the responsibility of every cat owner. In many districts across Australia, laws do in fact exist with heavy penalties imposed on cat owners if their cats are found roaming the streets.

Councils across Australia are increasingly introducing strict containment laws and curfews in the interest of protecting cats, wildlife and reducing neighbourhood nuisance complaints.

In the ACT, all new cats across all suburbs will need to be contained at all times from July 1st 2022.

This landmark decision from the ACT is the first time laws have been introduced state or territory wide and is sign of what's to come Australia wide.

Residents in regulated suburbs often protest against new laws, not understanding the devastating impact their cats are having on wildlife, and often not understanding just how easy it is to comply with the new laws simply by building an affordable DIY cat run.

Awareness

Australia has one of the highest rates of pet ownership in the world, with over a quarter of Australian households owning a cat. There are approximately 6.5 million cats across Australia, with pet cats accounting for around 3.77 million of the total cat population.

Sadly, pet cats in Australia collectively kill 390 million animals per year, with many species now extinct because of predatory events.

Every cat owner has an important role to play in reducing the impact that cats have on our wildlife and protected species. Containment is a step in the right direction to help protect our wildlife.

Wellbeing

Creating a sanctuary at home where a cat feels safe and happy is important.
Research shows that a mentally and physically stimulated cat is happier and healthier, and as a result may live longer.

It's important that a cat's outdoor enclosure is set up according to its environmental and behavioural needs. These needs may centre around its age, personality, and basic need for rest, play and stimulation. All cats need vertical space, so climbing furniture is critical, and toys are a great way to keep them entertained and stimulated, while scratching surfaces are important to satisfy their basic animal instincts.


