A. Accept Minutes: Unanimous approval.

B. FY 2022/23 Service Planning Update

Operations Analyst Christopher Whitlock presented a slide comparing enrollment to pass sales for the past five years. Pass sales originally at 1.18 pass per student ratio in 2017/18. In 2021/22 pass per student ratio is .74. White Hill specifically has been declining for the past three years while Hidden Valley has slightly increased. However, there was a significant decline for both schools in the year following the start of the pandemic. Statewide enrollment continues to decline and is expected to decline 10% by 2030.

Whitlock then reviewed the route change for next year. Pain points for the program are in the afternoon and on the early departing routes. 3 of 4 routes are sold out and have a waitlist of students with WH-11 still having approximately 20 seats available. The highest waitlist is on WH-15 which serves the Butterfield area. The plan: WH-11, which currently ends in Fairfax, will be combined with WH-12 which currently goes up Butterfield and is a late departing afternoon route. WH-12 will start earlier, leaving White Hill immediately after the bell, and stop in Fairfax before serving the Sleepy Hollow area. As a result, the shared route between Ross Valley Charter and White Hill, WH-16, will be moved to a different driver and start approximately 10 minutes later.

Marin County Supervisor Katie Rice asked how many students would benefit from this change. Whitlock commented that approximately 17-20 more students. Fairfax Council member Renee Goddard asked if this change will accommodate all waitlisted students? Whitlock responded no. Katie Rice commented that 100 students were on the waitlist and asked about whether there were any students who were unable to get a pass in the current year. Whitlock commented that many of the students on the waitlist have passes on other routes. There is space on vehicles in the morning and afternoon. Families can purchase a pass but some choose not to because of other factors.

Trustee Wesley Pratt commented that son walks home from Good Earth and asked whether kids who live closer can walk to homes closer to Good Earth and others stay on the bus and go further up Butterfield? No, all seats in bus will be filled so it won't matter.

C. Measure AA Yellow Bus Funds Update

Whitlock reported that 5 schools have committed to be apart of the new three year Measure AA funding cycle. Based on information provided by the Transportation Authority of Marin and the commitment from the five schools, Marin Transit estimates an approximate \$215,000 available for Ross Valley. Previously, the estimate was \$190,000.

D. FY 2022/23 Budget Update and Pass Price

Whitlock first reviewed the current year's budget: 577 passes sold, with 38 of those being the reduced income qualified passes at a \$100 each. Previously, the program sold 25 income qualified passes. There is a surplus of \$13,000 to carry forward into FY 2022/23.

Whitlock reviewed Option A which was presented in the last meeting. But updates were made to the Measure AA funds (\$215,000) and the contributions from the Town of San Anselmo and Town of Fairfax were updated to reflect an added contribution of \$5,000 each. Fairfax Council member Renee Goddard commented that the \$5,000 added contribution has been approved. The contribution for the County of Marin was also updated to reflect an added contribution of \$10,000. Option A leaves the programs with a surplus of \$2,665.

Whitlock reviewed Option B with the same added contributions as in Option A. Option B leaves the programs with a deficit of \$2,149.

Whitlock concluded that Marin Transit recommends Option B because it assumes a decrease in passes sold, consistent with declining enrollment trends, keeps the pass price increase at a minimum, and brings all regularly priced passes to one price point which will make it easier for the program to sell single ride day passes at White Hill on the afternoon routes.

Fairfax Council member Renee Goddard asked for an explanation of the differences between the two options. Whitlock replied that the Option A raises the price of only the regularly priced passes and not the discounted afternoon or the income qualified passes. Option B raises the price for the regularly priced passes and the discounted afternoon passes. It also assumes a reduction in passes sold because of the declining enrollment.

Superintendent Marci Trahan asked what the revenue would be if Option B sold as many passes as the current year (577). Whitlock commented that possibly \$16,000 more. San Anselmo Council member Brian Colbert commented that it would be around \$20,000 more.

Marci Trahan asked about vehicle capacity on buses and whether this will change. Whitlock commented that Michael's Transportation now uses vehicles that have a maximum passenger capacity of 50 seats.

San Anselmo Town Manager David Donery moved and Fairfax Councilmember Renee Goddard second the approval of staff recommendation for Option B and FY 2022/23 budget. Approved unanimously by vote of hands.

Marin County Supervisor Kati Rice asked about next steps for communicating the pass price and lottery to families. Whitlock reported that Marin Transit aims to communicate this to families by April 29, 2022. San Anselmo Council member Brian Colbert commented that many families, especially those of 5th graders, lack knowledge or are unaware of the yellow school bus program details. Whitlock commented that the schools will assist in communicating this to families. Goddard suggested including references to Safe Routes to Schools in the communication for families that

are unable to purchase a bus pass. Rice suggested also communicating how the program is funded and what the local contributors are doing to assist the program. Whitlock replied that this information is on the program website but that Marin Transit will share this information with families.

2022/23 WHITE HILL LOTTERY

2022/23 White Hill Bus Pass Lottery Results



Lottery registration open from May 2nd through May 13th

• 286 families registered (316 students total)



Route award distribution beginning May 15th

- Awards based on routes selected by families on the lottery registration form AND each family's 2-letter placement code
- Families given 7 day to purchase their awarded routes
- MT staff called unresponsive families for high demand routes

Hidden Valley and Ross Valley Charter passes made available for purchase on May 23rd

Lottery Challenges and Takeaways



- Families requested the following afternoon routes the most on the lottery registration form:
 - WH-9 Express to San Anselmo Hub: 86 students
 - WH-10 Memorial Park: 84 students
 - WH-15 Red Hill Ave via Butterfield: **75 students**
- Some families were unable to determine their morning start time and unsure if a zero or first period route was needed, resulting in changing their route preferences later in the summer
- The lottery continues to provide an equitable method of pass distribution but is a lengthy process



FY 2022/23 Approved Budget – "Option B"



Assumptions:

- 5 bus program
- All one-way pass price increased to from \$505 to \$515
 - No discounted price for late departing routes (e.g., \$425)
- Income qualified one-way passes priced at \$100 (20% of full price)
- Contractor expenses increased from \$632 to \$651 per bus per day
- Assumed a 6% reduction is pass sales due to declining enrollment
- Contributions increased:
 - San Anselmo/Fairfax: \$35,500 each
 - Marin County: \$100,000
- Added fuel contingency
- Includes \$13,000 FY 21/22 carryforward
